



In Memoriam – Joe Andrews



Joseph Edwin Andrews, 61, of Cameron, NC, passed away June 19, 2021, at his home surrounded by family following a courageous 17-month battle with pancreatic cancer.

In high school, Joe was a competitive swimmer. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Marine Biology from the University of Wilmington.

Joe worked for NC Fisheries helping with research on Turtle Exclusion Devices, amongst many other duties. He became interested in Vector Disease Control and went to work for North Carolina Public Health Pest Management. Eventually he moved to the private sector in mosquito control.

Joe was active in half a dozen professional associations and was Board President of the North Carolina Vector and Disease Association and the Mid-Atlantic Mosquito Control Association. During his tenure, he became known for his teaching and training. Joe served as the At-Large Member on the SCMCA Board of Directors in 2010 and in 2016.

Joe received several awards, including the Hamilton Stevens Award for Outstanding Performance, The Silver Dipper Award, and the Outstanding Service Award from the Mid-Atlantic Mosquito Control Association.

Joe was also a dedicated volunteer for the Friends of Madison County Animals and the Southeast Llama Rescue. He was manager of the Sanford Farmers' Market and was an avid hunter and fisherman.

Joe is survived by his wife Laurie Alvin Andrews, his children, Aurea Andrews, and Molly Andrews Williams (Sean) and by his sisters, Marian Andrews Brenton (Douglas), Carolyn Andrews, and Laurie Andrews Manley (Junior), and his rescued dog, Muddy Malone.


In Memoriam - Kim Todd



Upper Region

City of Edgefield

David Coleman with the City of Edgefield stated that no complaints have been received this season. The department has been unable to spray this season due to staffing and equipment maintenance concerns.

City of Fountain Inn

Lori Cooper with the City of Fountain Inn stated they have only received two complaints this season. The department has continued using Biomist to spray within city limits with success.

City of Gaffney

Barry Bundy with the City of Gaffney stated that no complaints have been received this season. The department has continued to use Deltagard with success. He also stated that this has been a moderate season compared to past seasons.

Greenwood County Lake Management

Julie Davis with Greenwood County Lake Management stated that only one complaint has been received so far this season. Larvaciding is completed using Vectobac liquid and Altosid brisquettes in shallow, stagnant pools of water around Lake Greenwood. Treatments are completed using a boat and two-man crew.

Middle Region

Richland County

We had a budget cut to our seasonal staff so we were unable to hire anyone this spring. We are also limited on how long the folks we do have can stay. We have funds to hire a new administrative support person, and have a number of applicants for the position that we are processing. We have been conducting our routine surveillance along with West Nile surveillance. Olin Towery has begun running RAMP testing on some of our gravid collections and the rest we submit to DHEC for testing. We have not provided any educational outreach activities because of COVID-19. We have been attempting to gain control at a few major breeding sites where it simply isn't feasible and have therefore been presenting the information for documentation of why & where we need drone capability. Otherwise, things have been steady so far. We'll wait to see what Fred and any other hurricanes hold in store for the future.

Lower Region

Berkeley County

This year started out very dry in Berkeley County. As a result, we have had a mild mosquito season so far. The only major exception being the fairly large numbers of salt marsh species seen in July, but it wasn't quite as bad as June 2020 when we had to spray aerially. This was also a localized problem that only affected a few areas of the county. I imagine we will still experience our seemingly inevitable woodland floodwater species hatch-offs in September/October. Our department is prepared to deal with whatever the rest of the season brings.

Andrew Starland

Beaufort County

In Beaufort County, the 2021 mosquito season started slowly, like it did in most of the state. Much of the state was experiencing an Abnormally Dry drought status into the spring. In Beaufort, the parched soil soaked up any rainfall we had, but Tropical Storm Elsa brought more rain than the soil could stand. This was the turning point for the mosquito season here in Beaufort County. Multiple rainfall events have followed Elsa leading to a wetter July than in 2020. Our mosquito collections and service requests greatly increased in July, compared to 2020. We had 327 service requests in July, compared to 130 in July of 2020. As a result of the increased mosquito populations, we've treated more acres by ground ULV than 2020 (48,170 acres in July 2021 vs 24,299 acres in July 2020.)

In February, we were finally able to fill our vacant Chief Pilot position. Matt Morgan joined our team following his retirement from the U.S. Navy. Matt served for 25 years as a Navy fighter pilot and prior to retiring was the Commanding Officer of an F-18 squadron based in California. He was raised in Beaufort County, where his family still lives, so he was eager to return and we're extremely fortunate to have someone with his experience leading our Air Ops program.

MAMCA President

Lower Region

Charleston County

April and May were relatively dry in the Charleston region, but that status ended in June. Multiple rainfall events, including the county-wide effects of the remnants of Tropical Storms (TS) Claudette and Danny, along with seven days of "king" tide peaks, ramped up program surveillance and control activities to typical summer levels. July's weather and tides carried on June's trends, as TS Elsa and nearly continuous daily thunderstorms and scattered rain showers generated conditions comparable to June's. The program recognized National Mosquito Control Awareness Week with several public education activities that included local TV/ newspaper coverage of our neighborhood public education door-to-door one-day Citizens Awareness Program (CAP) effort that reached out to over one hundred residences. The overhaul of one of the program's helicopters was completed in June, giving us the valuable inspection and treatment capability of two rotorcraft. The program received budget approval to hire a Field Inspector, bringing our complement to seven, and also approval to hire an assistant manager. Both hires will help the program to better serve the rapidly growing number of residents and visitors to Charleston County.
